

Influenza (flu) vaccine for children

Have you had the conversation with your doctor or nurse about protecting your child against the flu?

What is influenza (flu)?

Influenza, commonly called "the flu", is caused by the influenza virus. It results in an illness that typically affects the nose, throat and lungs and can easily spread within families and the community.

What are the symptoms of the flu?

- Fever and irritability
- Cough or noisy breathing
- Headache, muscle aches, tiredness

- Sore throat and runny nose
- Loss of appetite or poor feeding
- Nausea, vomiting or diarrhoea

How serious is the flu for children?

One in 3 children who catch the flu are hospitalised and most flu-related hospital admissions and deaths occur in previously healthy children.

What is the best way to prevent the flu?

The best way to prevent the flu is to get the influenza vaccine at the start of each flu season.

The vaccine will give your child immunity for up to 6-12 months, therefore getting the flu vaccine every year is important.

WA has a comprehensive vaccine safety system and real-time flu vaccine safety data is available each week at www.ausvaxsafety.org.au.

What about other vaccines and the influenza vaccine?

The influenza vaccine can be co-administered with other immunisations on the Western Australian Immunisation schedule including COVID-19 and Nirsevimab.



The flu vaccine is FREE for children most at risk, including:

- All children aged 6 months to Year 6 of primary school.
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, from 6 months of age onwards.
- All children on long-term aspirin therapy, from 6 months of age onwards.
- All children from 6 months of age onwards with a chronic medical condition, including:
 - o severe asthma
 - o chronic lung disease
 - o liver, kidney or heart conditions
 - o diseases of the nervous system
 - impaired immunity, including cancer
 - o diabetes
 - o metabolic or blood disorders
 - o trisomy 21.
